## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Soccer is a global pastime. From its uncertain origins in mid-nineteenth century England to its present-day status as a world-wide business and mass phenomenon, soccer has gone through dramatic transformations that have affected the sport itself but also the societies in which it is practiced. At the same time, soccer is a powerful marker of national and other types of collective identities. Flags, hymns, rivalries, myths, heroes, loyalties, and even violence, have become over time central elements of the practice of soccer, sometimes as or more important than playing style or tactics on the field.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

This class will explore the complex and intertwined history of soccer in Spain and Spanish America from the late nineteenth century to present times, using nationalism (and related processes such as globalization) as key elements to understand its evolution. Students will acquire a solid understanding of the place of soccer in society and their connection to the formation of national identities, while at the same time will deepen their knowledge of the history of both Spain and Spanish America.

## INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY

We will meet for two hours three times per week (Monday, Wednesday, and Friday) for lectures and discussion. In addition, we will watch a film or documentary every Wednesday afternoon, followed by discussion.
