COURSE DESCRIPTION

At the completion of this course, a student will understand the use of needs assessment, feasibility, and impact studies in the facility planning process; understand the concept of risk management as it relates to planning and managing a sport facility and event; understand key principles associated with managing a sport facility and event; and demonstrate knowledge of how to schedule, promote, and maintain sport facilities and events

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Student Outcomes. Students who successfully complete this course will:

1) Understand the use of needs assessment, feasibility, and impact studies in the facility planning process;

2) Understand the concept of risk management as it relates to planning and managing a sport facility and event;

3) Understand key principles associated with managing a sport facility and event; and

4) Demonstrate knowledge of how to schedule, promote, and maintain sport facilities and events.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY

Class Format: Class sessions will follow a seminar format with formal lecture-discussion, small group discussion, small group projects, and reflection/application papers. Assignments and Evaluations: Assignments are to be typed (12pt font; Times New Roman, 1" margins on all sides) and submitted to the instructor at the beginning of class on the assigned day (*unless otherwise noted below*). Late assignments will be accepted and evaluated by the instructor, but will receive *no grade*. Make up exams may be arranged with the instructor in advance of the scheduled exam date. Assignments *will not be accepted* via email unless specified by the instructor.

METHOD OF EVALUATION (GRADING)

Two examinations and a final will be offered throughout the semester. The exams may consist of matching, multiple-choice, and true-false. The final exam will be cumulative, although emphasis will be placed on the topics covered since the previous exam.
