University of Oregon – University of Otago Indigenous Studies Exchange (ISE) Program 2024 Call for Applications

The <u>UO-Otago Indigenous Studies Exchange (ISE) program</u> provides unique opportunities for select students from each campus to immerse themselves in Native American and Indigenous Studies (NAIS) academic and cultural activities in an international context. The Division of Global Engagement will offer full scholarships* to two UO students to participate in the Fall 2024 semester (July-November) at the University of Otago.

Native American and Indigenous Studies Majors and Minors at the University of Oregon will have the opportunity to explore Indigenous sovereignty and Native American and Indigenous Studies through the lens of the <u>University of Otago's Te Tumu School of Mäori, Pacific and Indigenous Studies programs</u>, an experience designed to help students frame their understanding of Native American and Indigenous Studies topics in the United States within a broader international Indigenous Studies perspective. Similarly, University of Otago students will have the opportunity to live with, learn from, and work alongside Native American and Indigenous students, NAIS majors and minors, and tribal communities and nations in and around the University of Oregon.

Scholarship Details

The UO-Otago ISE Scholarship will cover the full cost of tuition, room and board, airfare, passport and visa application fees (if applicable), and additional fees associated with required course or extra-curricular activities (if applicable).

Application Details

To apply for the UO-Otago ISE Scholarship, submit the following materials (in Word or PDF format) in one email to williamj@uoregon.edu by 5 p.m. on Monday, January 8, 2024.

- Unofficial transcript
- Letter of recommendation from a faculty member, an adviser, an employer, a volunteer coordinator, or a member of a tribal community (Your recommendation letter may be submitted separately by the recommender to williamj@uoregon.edu).
- A Personal Statement that explains your desire to participate in the UO-Otago ISE exchange (2-3 pages max, single-spaced). Your personal statement should also address the following two topics:
 - 1. Your academic goals and expectations for participation in this program.
 - 2. Examples of your community engagement and/or extra-curricular activities that are relevant for this program.
- Essay Question (1 page, max, single-spaced): In what concrete ways has your NAIS coursework and/or your experience in college and/or in your own communities prepared you to participate in the UO-Otago Indigenous Studies Exchange program?

AWARD SELECTION CRITERIA:

Minimum Qualifications

- GPA of 3.0 or above*
- NAIS Major or Minor
- 2 years of relevant coursework (1 year of which must be taken at UO)
- Rising Junior

*Exceptions to the GPA and NAIS Major/Minor requirements will be considered on a case by case basis. Prospective applicants who have less than a 3.0 GPA must meet with the GEO advisor and NAIS faculty representative prior to applying for an exception.

Preferred Qualifications

- Enrolled citizen or descendant of a federally recognized tribal nation
- Junior standing or above
- Completed ES 256 and/or ES 258, ES 321, ES 468

Selection Committee

Applications will be reviewed by a committee consisting of NAIS Faculty, DGE staff, and the Assistant Vice President and Advisor to the President on Sovereignty and Government-to-Government Relations.

Application Timeline

- All application materials must be submitted to williamj@uoregon.edu no later than 5 p.m. on Monday, January 8, 2024.
- The selection committee will review the application materials from January 8 to January 20.
- If necessary, candidate interviews will be held in late January.
- Scholarship Award letters will be issued no later than January 31.

All UO-Otago ISE participants will be required to apply for the program through the <u>Global Education Oregon (GEO) website</u> no later than February 1, 2024. A scholarship award offer does not constitute acceptance into the program; receipt of scholarship funds is subject to the student's completion of all aspects of the GEO application and acceptance of GEO policies and procedures.
